Later broods had better weather (warmer and not as wet) and may result in decent hunting in some areas of the state.

DU Pacific Flyway Forecast 2011:

Pacific Flyway

The majority of Pacific Flyway waterfowl are raised on the prairies of the United States and Canada, as well as in Alaska, northwestern Canada, and other western states. Alberta is a vital breeding area for continental waterfowl populations, but is especially important to Pacific Flyway waterfowl. In 2011, an estimated 4.3 million breeding ducks were surveyed across the Prairie Pothole Region of this province. This year's breeding duck population in southern Alberta was up 66 percent from last year and was similar to the long-term average. Several species posted significant increases, including pintails (+171 percent), green-winged teal (+112 percent), redheads (+85 percent), scaup (+80 percent), American wigeon (+61 percent), blue-winged teal (+60 percent), and mallards (+57 percent).

DU Canada biologist Ian McFar-

lane reports that habitat conditions were excellent for breeding waterfowl across the grasslands of southern Alberta, a highly productive breeding area for pintails, mallards, and many other ducks when wetland conditions are favorable. In addition, heavy rainfall in late May and June recharged wetland basins across much of Alberta's aspen parkland region. "Upland nesting habitat was in good to excellent condition across Alberta's agricultural zone, and wet weather delayed haying activity, which likely enhanced nesting success," McFarlane says. "Our field staff observed increasing numbers of duck broods as the season progressed, and Canada goose goslings were almost fully feathered by mid-July. Overall, the waterfowl production forecast is above average on the prairie and average in the aspen parkland."

When the prairies are dry, as they often are, many breeding ducks simply bypass the parched pothole country and settle farther north in the boreal forest and Arctic, where wetland conditions are less variable. The opposite occurs when the prairies are wet, as this year's waterfowl surveys likely indicated. Across central and northern Alberta, northeastern British Columbia, and the Northwest Territories, total breeding ducks decreased 19 percent in 2011. Fewer waterfowl were also surveyed in Alaska and the Yukon Territory, where duck numbers were down by roughly one-third from the previous year's estimate. Nevertheless, these northern survey areas were hardly devoid of waterfowl, collectively supporting almost 11 million breeding ducks, or nearly one-quarter of the total population in the traditional survey area.

Board Meeting Minutes August 16, 2011

Members present: Greg Johnson, Peter Bakun, Steve Fink, Al Gadoury Mike Heard, Jeff Squire, Cheryl Johnson. Members absent: David French, Sam Robinson, Jack Weiss.

Minutes from the June 21, 2001 meeting read and approved with minor corrections.

Treasurer's Report: Steve presented income statements for recent club events. HRC upland event held in May made a profit of \$80.58; HRC event held in July made a profit of \$557.70; NSTRA held in March made a profit of \$644.80; Pointer Training made a profit of \$688.75 from bird sales; Snake Break Clinic made a profit of \$260; Spaniel Hunt Test made a profit ~\$221; TEDs are holding their own.

Retriever Report: HRC went well; made a profit (see above).

Pointer Report: Training on Thursday evenings has been hampered by rain. The last PDE will be held Aug. 20. They had to limit the number of entries. There will be 17 braces for which they purchased 41 birds @ \$6/bird.

Spaniel Report: Training has been sporadic. The group trained near Big Sky. The grounds there are great; lush grasses and miniscule weeds. Hunt Test held June 25 and 26 had low number of entries, but still made a profit (see above). The final TED hosted by the Spaniel Group, was held Aug. 13. There were ~12 dogs entered. The evaluations were made on categories (i.e. best performance by a senior dog, best performance for the day, etc.). Since the Spaniel Group loses two training Saturdays per month, it was mentioned

that the TEDs may be moved to Sundays.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:
2012 Bird Purchases: Steve informed the Board that Take Flight was not offering the \$1 off price for purchasing and paying up front as they did last year. The cost for birds will be \$14 for rooster pheasants and \$7 for chuckars. The Retriever Group will need 50 rooster pheasants and 125 chuckars for the HRC Upland test to be held May 5 & 6, 2012 at the training grounds and the HRC Hunt Test to be held July 28 & 29, 2012 at Totten's. That is figuring 3.5 birds/dog to get two flushes.

Compensation for Setzer's: At the Spaniel Hunt Test, the Spaniel Group presented Randy with a check for \$600 for the use of his property to store club items, house the birds, and offer of a small token of the club's appreciation for all they do for the club.

Banquet Arrangements: The banquet will be held Saturday, February 11, 2012. Jeff Squire is firming up arrangements with Johnnie Carino's to again hold the banquet at their facility. It was suggested that RSVPs be sent at the same time the renewal notices go out to members to pay their dues.

Weed Spraying at Training Grounds: It looks good where Randy sprayed. However, there is still a lot of foxtail barley and needle-and-thread on the remaining training grounds.

NEW BUSINESS:
Treasurer's Resignation Letter: Steve sent Greg a letter of resignation effective February 2012. The Board discussed possible candidates for replacement and thanked Steve for the

great job he did while occupying that position on the Board.

Great Rockies Sports Show: Mike had applications available should the Board vote to participate again as they had last year. This time it will be held at the Brick Breeden Fieldhouse on February 24, 25 & 26, 2012. The Board felt that it would be a better place than the fairgrounds and that more people would attend. The Board voted to pay the \$320 entry fee + \$5 electrical fee which allows for 12 worker badges. Those working the event will not have to pay an entry fee to attend the Sports Show. The possibility of splitting the cost with Pheasants Forever was mentioned and Greg will check with Scott Benowitz on that.

Storage Trailer for Retrieve Events: A motion was made to sell the trailer and give Randy 20% commission on the sale. Motion approved. Sam Robinson has a lead on a newer trailer that the club could purchase. Wayne Fredrickson was mentioned as someone who could possibly look at the trailer and assess its value before the club commits to purchasing it.

Road Fill – Training Grounds and Setzer's Property: A motion was made to purchase gravel to fill in the road at the training grounds and low areas of Setzer's yard. Motion approved.

Nominating Committee: Greg mentioned that at the October 18 meeting we need to form a nominating committee to identify possible candidates for the positions on the Board that will be vacated in February.

Other Business:

A motion was made that the Board set a budget for next year. This would help members when planning events know what their spending limit it for that event. Motion approved. Mike mentioned that Margo Ellis will be attending an event in Canada. He said that the Canadians purchase remote controlled wingers for their event and afterwards sell the wingers for a reduced cost. Wingers cost ~\$500/winger and are sold for ~\$250 each. A motion was made to allow Margo to spend up to \$500 for the purchase of two of the discounted wingers. Motion approved.

Meeting adjourned. Next meeting will be held October 18, 2011.

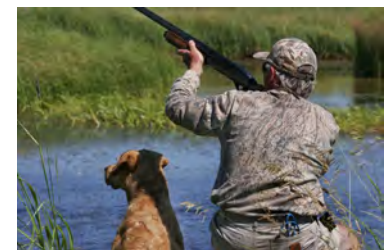
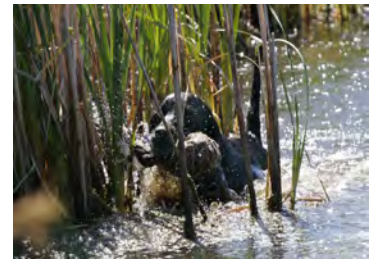

Dog Mourns at Casket of Fallen Navy SEAL

Navy SEAL Jon Tumilson lay in a coffin, draped in an American flag, in front of a tearful audience mourning his death in Afghanistan. Soon an old friend appeared, and like a fellow soldier on a battlefield, his loyal dog refused to leave him behind.

Tumilson's Labrador retriever, Hawkeye, was photographed lying by Tumilson's casket in a heart-wrenching image taken at the funeral service in Tumilson's hometown of Rockford, Iowa, earlier this week. Hawkeye walked up to the casket at the beginning of the service and then dropped down with a heaving sigh as about 1,500 mourners witnessed a dog accompanying his master until the end.

The photo was snapped by Tumilson's cousin, Lisa Pembleton, and posted on her Facebook page in memory of the San Diego resident. Tumilson, 35, was one of 30 American troops, including 22 Navy SEALs, who was killed when a Taliban insurgent shot down a Chinook helicopter with a rocket-propelled grenade on Aug. 6.

"I felt compelled to take one photo to share with family members that couldn't make it or couldn't see what I could from the aisle," Pembleton wrote on her Facebook page. "To say that he was an amazing man doesn't do him justice. The loss of Jon to his family, military family and friends is immeasurable."

Hawkeye was such a huge part of Tumilson's life that Tumilson's family followed the dog down the aisle as they entered the service in front of a capacity crowd in the gymnasium at the Rudd-Rockford-Marble Rock Community School. Hawkeye then followed Tumilson's good friend, Scott Nichols, as Nichols approached the stage to give a speech. As Nichols prepared to memorialize his friend, Hawkeye dutifully laid down near the casket.

The youngest of three children, Tumilson had wanted to be a Navy SEAL since he was a teenager. Friends and his two older sisters remembered a fearless soldier, and a Power Point presentation was shown that illustrated Tumilson's active life outside of the military, which included scuba diving, martial arts, and triathlons.

"If J.T. had known he was going to be shot down when going to the aid of others, he would have went anyway," friend Boe Nankivel said at the service.

"Your dreams were big and seemed impossible to nearly everyone on the outside," his sister, Kristie Pohlman, said at the service. "I always knew you'd somehow do what you wanted."

As for Hawkeye, the loyal Labrador will now be owned by Nichols, Tumilson's friend.

Evaluations and Placements for the August 13 Flushing Dog Training Evaluation Day

The dog that made the best 200 yard retrieve that was actually only about 70 yards goes to Spot. Spot sort of blew by the mark, got a little exercise and then came right back to the fall, picked it up and hand delivered to Jack.

The best 40 yard find and flush goes to Bella. We had a moment when the light and variable wind changed to a headwind and Bella caught the scent cone and away she went. This dog also made the ground tremble at the start of the course.

The retrieve of the day goes to Bennie. The bird was flushed in the cattails, flew over the creek and was dropped at 60 yards (nice shot Randy). Bennie, down in the cattails keyed on the flight of the bird and buttoned the retrieve.

The best dog on saving ammo goes to Chase. She trapped 3 of 4 birds. Good thing because Kyle only had two shells. She also had excellent ground coverage, finding birds when scenting conditions were almost non-existent.

The most persistent find goes to Gillie. The second bird had moved into the vegetation along the creek and Gillie never gave up until the bird was flushed. Dead-eye Benowitz rode it out to about 20 yards (or was that 70, I had trouble reading my notes) before cleanly killing it with one shot!

The best young prospect goes to Maggie. She enthusiastically flushed birds, made a nice retrieve and trapped a bird, bringing both to hand. Ed and Maggie made a nice team and we're looking forward to some great hunting stories from the two of them.

The best dog and handler duo went to Felix and Tom Clark. Very quiet handling, Felix frequently checked in and made a nice retrieve to hand.

The best finds and flushes were made by Dakota when scenting conditions were marginal at best. Dakota thoroughly covered the ground and maintained good range providing Randy P. with some good shots.

The best new handler in TED's goes to Dennis and Kerri. Dennis made two nice retrieves and did an excellent job on the blind. Kerri did an exceptional job of handling Dennis on the blind.

The Blue Ribbon performance by a senior dog goes to Dottie. She made excellent finds and did the best of all dogs on the blind retrieve. Kudos to Jack for holding it together when the pressure was on!!
